1. Compute and draw the image of the unit square in  $\mathbb{R}^2$  under the linear map with matrix  $A = \begin{bmatrix} 5 & 3 \\ 0 & 4 \end{bmatrix}$ .

2. Consider the plane in  $\mathbb{R}^3$  that contains the points  $\mathbf{p}_0 = \begin{bmatrix} 1 \\ -2 \\ 1 \end{bmatrix}$ ,  $\mathbf{p}_1 = \begin{bmatrix} 1 \\ 1 \end{bmatrix}$ 

$$\begin{bmatrix} 1 \\ 0 \\ 3 \end{bmatrix}$$
 and  $\mathbf{p}_2 = \begin{bmatrix} -1 \\ -1 \\ 1 \end{bmatrix}$ . Consider also the line in  $\mathbb{R}^3$  containing the

points 
$$\mathbf{q}_0 = \begin{bmatrix} 1 \\ 1 \\ 1 \end{bmatrix}$$
 and  $\mathbf{q}_1 = \begin{bmatrix} 0 \\ -1 \\ 3 \end{bmatrix}$ 

(a) Find an equation for the plane.

(b) Parametrize the line.

(c) Compute the point of intersection of the plane and the line.

3. Consider the line in  $\mathbb{R}^3$  with equation 2x-2y+z=6, -x+4y+z=-3. Find an equivalent system of equations of the form  $\mathbf{a}_1 \cdot \mathbf{x} = d_1$ ,  $\mathbf{a}_2 \cdot \mathbf{x} = d_2$  with  $\mathbf{a}_1 \cdot \mathbf{a}_2 = 0$ 

(Hint: you can keep the first equation and modify the second to get the result. The new equations express the line as the intersection of two orthogonal planes.)
